



Let's discuss predictions







Predictions

- Two of the more famous predictions
- Weather forecasters are correct 50% of the time and it only gets better when they are forecasting for the same day's weather.
- Going back to 1887, Punxsutawney Phil, a groundhog, is correct in predicting the end of winter about 39 % of the time (99 longer winters, 15 early springs, 9 missing years)



Predictions

"We know far more about prediction than we used to, including the fact that some of us are better at it than others. But prediction is also a learned skill, at least in part — it's something that we can all become better at with practice. And that's good news for businesses, which have tremendous incentives to predict a myriad of things."

 The most famous research on prediction was done by Philip Tetlock of the University of Pennsylvania, and his seminal 2006 book Expert Political Judgment provides crucial background. Tetlock asked a group of pundits and foreign affairs experts to predict geopolitical events, like whether the Soviet Union would disintegrate by 1993. Overall, the "experts" struggled to perform better than "dart-throwing chimps", and were consistently less accurate than even relatively simple statistical algorithms. This was true of liberals and conservatives, and regardless of professional credentials.



Predictions

 But Tetlock did uncover one style of thinking that seemed to aid prediction. Those who preferred to consider multiple explanations and balance them together before making a prediction performed better than those who relied on a single big idea. Tetlock called the first group foxes and the second group hedgehogs, <u>after an essay by Isaiah Berlin</u>. As Tetlock writes:

"The intellectually **aggressive hedgehogs knew one big thing and sought**, under the banner of parsimony, to expand the explanatory power of that big thing to "cover" new cases; **the more eclectic foxes knew many little things** and were content to improvise ad hoc solutions to keep pace with a rapidly changing world."



Predictions - ACA and the NFIB Case

- Remembering the ACA and how we arrived at Medicaid Expansion Supreme Court Decision, Chief Justice Roberts - National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB) v. Sebelius (2012)
- The Medicaid Expansion is Unconstitutionally Coercive of States Because States Lacked Adequate Notice to Voluntarily Consent and the Secretary Could Withhold All Existing Medicaid Funds
- In determining the constitutionality of the ACA's Medicaid expansion, the Court revisited the overarching question about the proper division of power between the federal government and the states when Congress exercises its spending power. All members of the Court agreed that Congress may offer grants to states and require states to comply with certain conditions in return. The Court disagreed, however, about the limits on the scope of Congress' power in this area. The differing views on this issue led to divergent conclusions about the constitutionality of the ACA's Medicaid expansion and its relationship to the rest of the Medicaid program. (Federalism concept)
- In National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB) v. Sebelius, the Supreme Court upheld the constitutionality of the individual mandate but effectively made the Medicaid expansion a state option.



Repeal and replace, delay the replace, replace and repeal

- The 2016 uninsured rate remains at an all time low with the uninsured rate at <u>11.9%</u> for Americans 18 – 64 and 8.6% for all Americans. 8.6% is down from <u>9.1%</u> as of 4th quarter 2015, and <u>15.7%</u> before the Affordable Care Act was signed into law(Obamacare facts).
- Provisions of the Affordable Care Act have resulted in an estimated **20 million people gaining health insurance coverage between the passage of the law in 2010 and early 2016**—an historic reduction in the uninsured. Those provisions include Medicaid expansion, Health Insurance Marketplace coverage, and changes in private insurance that allow young adults to stay on their parent's health insurance plans and require plans to cover people with pre-existing health conditions.
- Although repeal and replace is on the front burner, it will be difficult to achieve consensus on replacement language.



Repeal and replace, delay the replace, replace and repeal

- Kids until age 26 on parents plans, Foster Care until 26 through Medicaid
 - 2.3 million young adults gained coverage from 2010 through the start of Open Enrollment in October 2013 due to the provision that allows people under age 26 to stay on their parents' plan
 - An additional 3.8 million young adults gained coverage between October 2013 and early 2016, a 46.5 percent drop in the number of uninsured young adults over that period. (HHS March 3, 2016)

Bottom line according to some

- President Trump and the Congress will look to amend the core mechanisms adopted in the ACA to expand coverage that are identified as "Obamacare"
- Many other pre-ACA, ACA and post ACA reforms are likely to remain in place
- Provisions at risk
 - Individual market mechanisms
 - Exchanges
 - Subsidies (advance premium tax credits, cost sharing reductions)
 - Mandates (individual and employer)
 - Federally funded Medicaid Expansion
- Likely to remain
 - Expanded use of IT
 - Some reinsurance market reforms
 - Expansion of Part D
 - MACRA payment reforms (Medicare and CHIP Reauthorization)
 - Age 26 provisions



Staying the course

- <u>Quality</u>. Consumers are reshaping the market and providers are taking on more accountability toward healthier and productive populations
- <u>Cost.</u> Costs in Medicaid are high, margins are becoming leaner.
- <u>Value</u>. Determining weather the cost is producing the quality and if not, then what.
- <u>Integration</u>. There will be more, before less. How to contain the explosion in care coordination without breaking the bank.
- <u>Compassion</u>. Establishing the direct line between who we serve put them in the center of everything we do.
- Notice I didn't say innovation
